



# Title: Seminar on revival of traditional culture & knowledge of Indigenous people by mitigating Climate change

The seminar aims to raise awareness, emphasize the role of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), share best practices, and empower indigenous communities. It spans two days, featuring presentations, panel discussions, and insights into traditional knowledge's significance and international organizations' role.

The evaluation process includes pre- and post-seminar surveys to measure knowledge and attitude changes, feedback forms for improvement suggestions, and a review of outcomes. Continuous improvement ensures future seminars better address the challenges faced by indigenous communities regarding climate change and traditional knowledge preservation.

## Seminar on revival of traditional culture & knowledge of indigenous people by mitigating climate change

## About:

The relationship between climate change and the loss of traditional knowledge among India's indigenous communities is a complex issue. These communities, such as Adivasis, north-eastern tribes, central Indian tribes, and those in the Western Ghats, have preserved their unique cultural heritage and wisdom for generations. However, climate change now threatens to erode this invaluable knowledge.

### **Impact of Climate Change:**

Climate change disrupts traditional practices in various ways

- 1. Agriculture: Unpredictable weather patterns disrupt traditional farming, affecting planting and harvesting times, resulting in reduced crop yields.
- 2. Ecosystems: Climate change shifts plant and animal species distribution, impacting traditional hunting and gathering practices.
- 3. Traditional Medicine: Changes in the distribution of medicinal plants due to climate change endanger traditional healing knowledge.
- 4. Water Management: Climate change affects rainwater harvesting and irrigation methods by altering precipitation patterns.
- 5. Cultural Heritage: Climate change endangers cultural practices closely tied to the environment.

#### **Most Affected Indigenous Groups:**

- 1. Jarawa's of Andaman Islands: Threatened by rising sea levels and cyclonic activity affecting traditional practices.
- 2. Lepchas of Sikkim: Traditional farming practices are jeopardized by shifting weather patterns.

- 3. Toda Tribe of Nilgiris: Disrupted cattle-rearing practices due to changing grazing patterns and water scarcity.
- 4. Gaddi Tribe of Himachal Pradesh: Climate-induced pasture changes affect traditional transhumance practices.

#### **Impact on Transmission of Traditional Knowledge:**

- 1. Environment Changes: Altered environments render some traditional knowledge obsolete.
- 2. Loss of Land/Resources: Loss of land and resources threatens knowledge tied to these areas.
- 3. Displacement/Migration: Climate-induced migration risks knowledge loss as communities leave ancestral lands.
- 4. Language Loss: Displacement and assimilation can lead to language loss, impacting traditional knowledge.
- 5. Recognition Gap: Lack of recognition in climate policies exacerbates knowledge loss.

### **Examples of Impacted Traditional Knowledge:**

Climate change impacts various traditional knowledge areas, resulting in livelihood loss:

- 1. Agriculture: Unpredictable weather disrupts planting and harvesting schedules.
- 2. Hunting/Fishing: Climate-driven species shifts affect traditional practices.
- 3. Medicinal Plants: Changing plant distribution endangers traditional healing knowledge.
- 4. Water Management: Precipitation changes affect traditional water management.
- 5. Traditional Ecological Knowledge: Climate-induced environmental shifts disrupt ecological knowledge.

- 4. To promote community involvement and empowerment in preserving traditional knowledge while generating economic opportunity in current scenario.
